<ul> <li>- Asking / Talking about places in town: Is there a cinema? Yes, there is. No, there isn't.</li> <li>- Where is the cinema? It's near the library.</li> </ul>	- Prepositions (place): between, in front of, opposite - Use of possessive -'s for shops	<ul> <li>Places in a town and public buildings: street, post office, bank, cinema, park, café, hotel, library, station, hospital, museum, stadium, church, restaurant, fire station, police station, parking area</li> <li>Signposts in town: bus stop, traffic lights</li> <li>Shops: toy shop, music shop, sports shop, supermarket, shopping centre, department store, dairy, stationer's, chemist's, greengrocer's, baker's, butcher's</li> </ul>

- Giving directions / Setting rules: Go straight on; Turn right	- Imperative: direct form - Do's and Don'ts	Words for directions: right, left, straight on, cross, turn
- Making polite requests: Can I borrow your pen, please?	- Modal verb <i>can</i> for requests (interrogative form)	<ul> <li>Food</li> <li>Countable nouns: apple, orange, sweet, biscuit</li> <li>Uncountable nouns: sugar, flour, salt</li> </ul>
- Buying / Getting things: Can I have three apples, please? Can I have some sugar, please? Here you are.	- Countable and uncountable nouns - Indefinite quantity: <i>some</i>	
- Asking for / Saying the price: How much is it? It's 50 euros.	- Question word: <i>How much?</i> - Irregular plural: <i>penny / pence</i>	<ul> <li>Numbers: a hundred, a thousand</li> <li>Money: euro, pound, penny (pl. pence)</li> </ul>
